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Dr. Leah Matsinha (PhD)

Dr Leah Matsinha holds a PhD in Chemistry awarded from the University of Cape Town. She has received several awards for her contribution in the field of Chemistry. The most recent award is that she is the recipient of the 2020 Royal Society funded Future Leaders: African Independent Researcher (FLAIR) £300 000 Grant. The FLAIR fellowship is a prestigious research grant awarded to young researchers to research in sub-Saharan Africa.

Dr Leah's research project focuses on finding alternative fuels that are cheaper and cleaner energy sources for Africa. The project seeks to convert cheap readily available glycerol (obtained as a byproduct during biodiesel production) and use biological and chemical transformations to produce fuels which can be used for cooking. She is very passionate about this research area because it affects a significant number of women in Africa who depend on firewood for cooking daily, particularly in rural areas. Using wood comes with several disadvantages that include deforestation and health effects such as eye irritation, lung diseases due to smoke inhalation, hypertension and even heart problems. The alternative is usually paraffin or LP gas; however, both are generally beyond the means for most of the underprivileged households.

In addition, this grant also provides much needed financial support to conduct research, mentorship and help young researchers establish international collaborations with renowned international researchers. The goal is to equip fellows to take up the mantle of Future African Leaders with an ability to bring about positive change and development in their respective communities. In line with this, Dr Leah currently works with young women in her lab and hopes to impart the knowledge she has acquired over the years to these students so that one day they too can be change-makers.

Throughout her studies and career, she has published several journals, including a book chapter in internationally reputable peer-reviewed journals.

Dr Leah completed her postdoctoral research fellowship in 2019 at the University of Johannesburg and is currently a lecturer and researcher at the same university. Throughout her studies and career, she has published several journals, including a book chapter in internationally reputable peer-reviewed journals. Dr Leah has presented her research work at various international chemistry conferences in Portugal, Singapore, China, Italy, and the Netherlands. She is a member of the Catalysis Society of South Africa (CATSA), South African Chemical Institute (SACI) and South African Council of Natural Scientific Professionals (SACNASP.

When she is not mixing chemicals in the laboratory, she loves to spend time in the kitchen, making meals for her family. Next on her academic journey is a plan to enrol for law school, imagine that! I guess it is safe to say we have a Dr Advocate Matsinha in the making. She looks to the future with bright determination and her zeal for learning and development is one from which many of us can take valuable notes.

Daniela Rakotomamonjy is the founder and CEO of ACE, a group of companies that focus on agribusiness and renewable energy projects in Madagascar. ACE consists of multi-sectoral companies specialized in public, private partnership projects in renewable energy, urban and rural land reform, agribusiness, and ecotourism.

Her passion lies in preserving nature through initiatives such as reforestation, beekeeping, organic farming, and green energy. She is engaged in various community initiatives that are focused on building communities and supporting young people. Her main focus areas are women empowerment, equal access to education, fighting youth drug abuse and providing professional training opportunities for people in her community.

Below she shares more insight about her vision and how she is working towards achieving it.

More than 820 million people are hungry globally. Among them, more than 4 million dead since January this year! Feeding the planet is everyone's problem, but I decided to make it my advocacy, and this is how I bring my contribution to Madagascar!

Bees pollinate around 75% of all crops in the world. Since 2006, more than 30% of honeybee colonies have disappeared, posing a significant threat to global agriculture. This phenomenon is caused primarily by excessive use of pesticides. This reduction mainly affects the availability of honey, honey by-products, fruits, and vegetables.

As stated by Dr Samuel Myers of Harvard University, the disappearance of honey on the market would lead to dietary changes that could increase the annual global non-communicable diseases and malnutrition mortality rates by an additional 2.7% per year. On a local level, the loss of honeybees not only reduces the availability of essential sources of nutrition but also decreases the availability of related jobs (e.g. beekeepers and gardeners).

My vision is to advocate for food security in the world and to create an environment favourable to the conservation and multiplication of honeybees.

The challenges are not only to promote beekeeping activities but also:

- The restoration of arid lands destroyed by bush fires for many successive years
- The reforestation from honey species
- The creation of jobs and sources of income for the local populations (98 people from the marginalized villages surrounding the project area)
- Awareness of biodiversity conservation (mainly the bees) and soil enrichment (fertilization, fight against bush fires, etc.)
- And finally, the promotion of organic farming and healthy food

My pilot project called Bee Mada counts 33 hectares reforested honeybee garden hosting 100 beehives, more than 25 000 tropical fruit trees and 1 hectare of fish and chicken farm. Apart from organic honey, fruit, and vegetable production, we also produce around 1.100 tons of organic rice per year.

We hand out more than 4% of our products to marginalized people, families, and the kids in the villages surrounding our projects. These include beehives, bee swarms, and different varieties of vegetables and bean seeds to them.

I still have many milestones ahead to achieve my vision, and so every day, I show up and give my best in everything I do.

I have learnt over the years not to be afraid of failure because it is part of the journey towards success. All you need to do is trust yourself and keep going eventually; you will succeed.

"Paper money does not define a country's riches. The nation's wealth lies hidden in its cultural heritage."

I believe Zimbabwe possesses a rich cultural heritage that remains untapped. Over the years, I have seen my fellow kinsman eagerly, embrace other cultures without hesitation. Dating back to the late '90s, and early 2000's when brands such as Fubu 05 and Sean John were a "must-have style" for the young generation of the day. Fast forward a few years into the millennium. Nollywood movies reached our boarders and, suddenly every woman wanted to dress like the popular Mama Azuka.

Over the last couple of years, I have had the privilege of living in Dubai, Joburg and also travelled to parts of Europe and Asia. Throughout, I noticed one common denominator -they all possess a well defined rich cultural heritage that governs their way of life. One key pillar supporting that cultural heritage was the evidence of a national attire.

In Dubai, the men wear what they call a dishdasha while women wear the Abaya (a long, black flowing light coat over their clothing). In South Africa, you can quickly identify a particular tribe by merely looking at their dress code.





Upon reflecting, I began to wonder why, as Zimbabwe, we lacked our unique national attire? Was it because we lacked creativity or people were not bothered about the greater good of preserving our cultural heritage? As a result, I decided to fill in the gap by developing a solution to the problem.







# How are you preserving your national culture for the next generation?

My name is Taurai Mushove, proudly Zimbabwean, and the founder of Zimcollar, a brand that creates fabric prints using some of the national monuments of Zimbabwe. Amongst the prints included is our very own Zim dashiki print specially designed to reflect the colours of our national flag. The dream behind Zimcollar was to develop an authentic Zim fabric for making multiple African styled clothing that carries symbols of our cultural heritage. 
# When I write, I am in my element

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#### I am Lazarus




If you enjoy history-altering novels, then I am Lazarus, is a mustread, that is bound to keep you entertained till the very last page.

Shingirai Katsvere is a distinguished Zimbabwean rugby player whose career spans over 12 years playing in both local and international tournaments. He has played in four HSBC World Rugby Tournaments and two Africa Cup tournaments alongside some of the nations finest players. In 2018 he won the Africa Cup Champions playing with the Zimbabwe 7 aside team (The Cheetahs); then went on to take home the Victoria Cup Championship trophy in 2019 playing with the Zimbabwe 15 aside team (The Sables). Currently, he plays for Old Georgians Club and looks forward to one day showcase his talent at prestigious rugby tournaments such as the Rugby World Cup. He is a man on a mission.



Sporting excellence was an inherited gift passed on from his grandfather the Zimbabwean football legend Edward 'Madhobha' Katsvere, who played for the national team and Dynamos football club in the eighties. He played alongside the likes of Moses Chunga and David Mandigora. Their dream team lifted the domestic premiership trophy seven times during the period from 1980-89. Naturally, as a young boy Shingi wanted to follow his grandfather's footsteps; however, one day, he stepped onto a rugby pitch, and discovered his own path.

One of the key pillars that have kept this gifted sportsman grounded and driven has been the many destiny supporters that God has placed in his life throughout his career. These include family, friends and fellow sporting peers. Someone close to the heart is his childhood friend, Munashe Kamunda, who inspired him to try out rugby in the first place. Later on, he met Coach Victor Pekani and Milton Rankeni who nurtured his talent at the Mbare academy when he was still a rookie in competitive rugby. In 2016 after sustaining a severe injury while playing for the Zim Under '20s, Shingirai almost threw in the towel. It was his coach at the time, Mr Farai B Mahari who came to the rescue and helped him find his way back into the game.

Without God, there would be no story to tell nor successes to share. In his own words, Shingi says,

"Growing up, I used to dedicate every game to my family. Then there was a time I played in honour of my former high school Prince Edward Tigers. I even remember at on point dedicating some games to my girlfriend at the time, talk about misplaced energy. But one day, I had a revelation that my gift was Godgiven, so instead of playing for people, I needed to start honouring Him with it. My family is my motivation, but I do not play for them. God is my source of strength; therefore, every opportunity I get to use this gift, all glory and praise belong to Him. When I play, I hope that people can see Christ in me. Rugby is how I preach to the nations and in the process, inspiring someone out there to pursue their area of calling."



A devout Christian, Shingirai is the head of sports for Ignite Youth Organisation and also the founder of Sports Discipleship Ministry, an NGO established to support athletes and give them a platform to testify about how God is changing their lives through sports. The organisation also provides support and mentoring to underprivileged children passionate, helping them discover and develop their areas of gifting. Part of the organisation's vision is to one day establish a children's home for the disadvantaged and homeless.

Shingirai is an marketing student who is always eager to learn new things. He describes himself as a courageous, purposedriven, humble and God-loving person. To everyone, he has the following words of encouragement.

"Manage your circle because it will guide you when you are lost. Never listen to negative comments over your life because human beings will always have an opinion about you. Be wise, stick to your path and chase after your dreams. Remember when things falling apart, there is always a light at the end of the tunnel. Positivity is the key to a fulfiling life."

Author of the transformational book 'When Fathers Go Missing' which tackles the manifold consequences of fatherlessness in all facets of society.



Relate with them by finding out what they are doing in class, sport, art etc. Encourage them. Affirm them. Celebrate them. This does not demand that you do algebra with them necessarily. If you can- the better. If you cant, just ask for the school report, identify the needy areas and demand an improvement. Celebrate the areas that they are doing well. The book is not about the melodramatic life of Mephibosheth. However, the essence of this chapter cannot overlook and resist the story of David and Mephibosheth. Without laboring the reader with the story, I will spare you the narration of this passage and hammer straight to the point. David remembers that he has a debt he has to pay, the debt of fatherhood. He wants to know whom he can father for the sake of the absentee father-Jonathan. Wow! And that is the essence of this book - to awaken fathers that will search for sons and daughters to father. Evidently, there is a yawning gap for fatherhood and there is a desperate need for the Davids of this generation to take up the challenge. Now lets break this down. How is this achievable?

Realistically, it is unwise to expect overnight results. Little by little, they will begin to open up and warm up to you. Do this to another child. Encourage another fellow father to do the same to another child. Before we know it, fatherlessness ceases to be the challenge and catastrophe that it currently is.

Imagine if our male teachers take this challenge. They frequently come across fatherless children. Imagine just fathering a child and follow them through class then sport monitoring their associations etc at a personal level and not at a classroom level. Imagine the impact that it can have. It might be in primary, secondary or even tertiary level. The child will not forget their teacher/father. All this can happen without governmental intervention, support, grant, budget etc. It simply calls for men to rise up.

Lets imagine again, a sports coach at a school or in a community. Youths who come to sport are generally passionate about their area of sport or art. Be it netball, basketball, soccer, music, dance to mention but a few. Why not coach life to the lads. To some, you are the only father they have seen and that they will ever see. Is it not fulfilling that you coached beyond sport. You coached life! The life principles outlive sport. That is more rewarding than a monthly income. My sport coaches therefore arise and become a corps of patriots!

She is the Executive Secretary for the Space Generation Advisory Council (in support of UN space programs) based in South Africa. She is an outer space technology enthusiast, public speaker, policy influencer and upcoming entrepreneur. She has spent the past seven years working on composite materials for space rockets' hottest components which include the nose tips, wing edges and engine nozzles. Below she shares more detail about her journey and how she looks forward to the upcoming space planes...

"The era of space technologies being viewed as abstract and far-fetched is long past. Space technologies are a part of every human being's everyday life 360 days a year; everyone has a role to play. From internet connectivity to GPS (global positioning system); growing telehealth systems to disasters mapping; economic resources mapping to precision agriculture – it is all-encompassing. The focus is to make the technologies more extensive and less expensive.

My story with aerospace materials is a reawakened childhood dream and a feat of serendipity. When I was looking for postgraduate research opportunities, I never thought much about the area of specialisation. Of course, I wanted it to be a composite materials speciality, but I had not narrowed it to specifics. One day I met a professor of ceramics, and he happened to be looking for a student to tackle aerospace vehicle applications. I enrolled!

Finding purpose is one of the most courageous undertakings in life, following purpose is the noblest of commitments and contributing to humanity is the highest call of fulfilling purpose.

The question I get asked the most on international platforms is, "You do this in Africa?" It brings to mind the line by Lupita Nyong'o when she said, "No matter where you're from, your dreams are valid." Our aim has been to work on materials in a manner that contributes to the field. Nothing less. In the process, we have made important connections and collaborations; geography has never been a limitation.

My encouragement to young people is for them to participate in civic development and leadership opportunities. In this fourth Industrial Revolution era, young people's grip and influence on information technology give incredible leverage in decision-making.

I have also learnt the value of volunteering; the lessons are invaluable. I am particularly indebted to the Space Generation Advisory Council for the opportunities to participate at the United Nations Office of the Outer Space (UNOOSA) and the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) platforms and projects. Examples are the Scientific and Technical Subcommittee of the Committee for the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space (STS-COPOUS) and the Commission on Science and Technology for Development (CSTD). My technical aspirations are on adding nuclear aerospace propulsion (power to move) to the fields of my contribution."

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
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My name is Nomazulu and music is my passion. Life has taught me that dreams are personal and should be guarded jealously. I come from a place where peers did not believe that one could have a meaningful career in music, so they laughed when I shared my desire to pursue music. Back then, their criticism felt like a punch in the stomach which left a dent on my confidence but eventually, I realised that what looks unreasonable to others is what may shape someone else's destiny.

I started singing at a very young age, and eventually joined the choir at my church. In 2006 I got the opportunity to lead the youth music team at my church, and this ignited my passion for music to another level. Throughout the journey, my husband has been one of my greatest supporters. In 2009 he urged me to enrol for a bachelor's degree in Music and Musicology at the Midlands State University, which I completed in 2014. Indeed he has been a destiny partner in every sense.

Think about it this way, how often after you hear a song, does it keep playing in your head hours or even days after you last heard it? When you look through the lenses of history, there are many stories told of how music shaped people's lives and, in some cases, brought about a complete revolution. A good example is the history of Zimbabwe; music was one of the crucial aspects of the Chimurenga War that established Zimbabwe independent state. If I were to sum it up, would say music is a potent communication tool that can easily touch the soul.

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
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# Minister of Whitelinen Image Consultant



# One mans journey from grief to finding solace through writing

#### Can you tell us more about your book in detail?

This book is about my story. It is about how I have walked my grief journey since I lost my wife to a tragic road accident on the 4th of May 2019. The book talks about how I have used three things to try and heal from my grief; namely my religion, road running hobby and the use of conversations and journals that my wife left behind.

The book sets the scene by narrating the events of that fateful day and the feelings I experienced. I then go on to focus on the events that have unfolded since that time. Growing up as an African man, I was taught that men have to bottle up their emotions and never show that they are not coping. The book clearly appeals to everyone to understand that grief journeys are different, and bottling up emotions is not the solution.

Talking about our grief situation is always the first point of healing and hence led me to start to wring this book. I did not want to be a statistic. I did not want to bottle up my emotions and end up doing things that may have resulted in me losing my life. I chose to live and fight!!!

#### When did you decide to share your story and how was the journey from writing the first sentence to publishing?

I never thought that one day I would write a book, let alone writing a book that talks about emotions. I have always been a naturally shy person who rarely shared any feelings with those that I am not close to. After the passing of my wife, I tried to look for reading material that would help me deal with my grief. I have always dealt with all my problems using a life toolbox. When I came unstuck, I always googled until I found the solution. This time around, I realised that all my strategies were not working somehow.

I could not find reading material that was directly applicable to my situation. Most of the material seemed like fiction – written by someone who had never experienced what I was going through. As a Christian, I looked for reading material that I could use, but that was also either too deeply religious without quoting real-life examples like mine or scratching on the surface and not applicable to me.


In the month of August 2019, as I was sitting on a flight from Johannesburg to Cape Town, the idea of writing down my feelings and thoughts came to me. I started typing, and by the time I got to Cape Town, I had typed a few pages in those hours. I then decided to post those pages on a blog under my Facebook profile. I received so many responses such that I was motivated to keep writing. A few friends then advised me to consider writing a book, and that's how the journey started.

#### What kind of support did you have throughout the journey?


I got a lot of support from my friends, family, church family, fellow runners and colleagues. I would also get a lot of supportive messages every time I published on my blog.

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
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### Can the World Run Out of Good People?

Since the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic social media and the internet have been inundated with conspiracies around Covid-19's origin, whether or not communities should accept vaccines that will be developed among other stories. In almost all the cases attempts are made to convince the reader, listener or viewer of this huge international power grab or profit making conspiracy that is going on. Let's face it. It is so confusing and many times people do not know what to believe, and sparring news outlets from different political constituencies and outfits (even in developed countries we may look up to) does not make it better. We live in a murky, smoke-and-mirrors world where the massive availability of information is both a boon and a curse.

Almost all conspiracy theories and fake news are rebutted in one way or another. International bureaucrats, tech and pharmaceutical companies and others who understand the intricacies of globalization and the international economy may be able to provide more substance regarding veracity or lack thereof in the different conspiracy claims better.

This article discusses whether the different checks and balances, safeguards and tried and tested protocols and regulations in various industries, organizations and governments can indeed be overcome by groups/entities with sinister motives. Can the world really run out of 'good people' to such an extent that people just sit on the fence or condone the subjection of entire populations to sinister machinations of certain groups?! It is fitting that the discussion whether the world can run out of good people also begins by asking whether the world can run out of good things in general.

In 1798, Thomas Robert Malthus predicted that linear growth in food supply would be outstripped by exponential growth in population. In his view, the human population would sooner rather than later implode until a natural disaster (such as pestilence) or war reduces the population. On the contrary the human population has grown massively since the late 18th Century on the back of farm biotechnology-driven yield improvements to guarantee food supplies, advancements in medical sciences, medicine and vaccine development among other factors. The combination of human agility, ingenuity and clever use of the world's natural endowments has proved that a Malthusian implosion is unlikely.

The assertions of Malthus haven't really come to pass (most Economists would agree), but some bad things have happened since the beginning of time. Market failure (a scenario in which the free market system fails to efficiently allocate resources) has shown us that when people compete to use forest resources, or when they compete to maximize their utility on a public beach, deforestation and pollution are inevitable respectively. The events of the past decades have shown that when migrants and host communities fight for scarce resources, prejudice, hate and violence can flare up.

So indeed, good things may run out under some conditions. Since time immemorial, people have suffered from abuse, violence, war and other forms of injustice and in many cases yet no one has done enough about it. Even as the Covid-19 pandemic ravages across the entire globe, guns and mortar fire have hardly fallen silent in some parts of the world. Yet due to geopolitical complications, indifference or just inward-looking tendencies, many have buried their heads in the sand. The fact that people can sit on the fence as injustices take place is an important driver of lack of trust in the institutions and apparatus of individual states and the world in general's ability to protect us from the harms 'purported' in some of the biggest conspiracy theories.

Not everyone can truly claim that they necessarily have a firm handle on how the world functions. There is just too much information out there to process, and many things are obscure - too many information asymmetries. Information asymmetry or information failure is a phenomenon in which one party in a transaction has material more information than the other, for example in George Akerlof's Market for Lemons where the seller of a second hand automobile had more material information about its true condition than the buyer. To abstract, a government requiring compulsory vaccination may have more material information on side-effects (among other issues) than the ordinary citizen all things being equal. Murkiness and lack of transparency also mean that transaction costs are high and it is difficult to enforce contracts - including the social contract between a government and its people.

The social contract between a government and its people provides for the citizens to expect and demand that the state act in the good interests of the citizenry. There are countless examples wherein governments have betrayed the trust of the population. This can be understood in the context of the Agency Problem wherein there is conflict of interest between the objectives of the principal and those of the agent. In a business setting, the shareholder (business owner) is interested in preserving and increasing the value of the business whereas management may be interested in expense maximization (thereby reducing profit and value) through perks. To protect the interests of the shareholders, the Board of Directors (Board) maintain oversight over the activities of management - yet "Management and the Board play golf together" thereby potentially reducing the effectiveness of oversight.

When state bodies that are supposed to act in the interests of the public are not sacrosanct in executing their mandate (for example in protecting against harmful practices in a medical emergency or otherwise), if they "play golf with those they are supposed to supervise", then it fuels distrust and creates an environment where conspiracies and fake news flourish. When levels of education are low, and there is little or no access to basic services including electricity and internet, people fall prey to fake content, including dangerous home remedies and even scammers.

There is clearly a need to increase access to Information **Technologies** (ITs) also implement deliberate programs for digital education so that ordinary citizens empowered to fact-check content but also to participate in digital education and in the digital workplace. Without digital education, negative consequences (fake news, scams etc.) of internet proliferation can spread almost unabated. The "new economy" post Covid-19 should do more to promote more accountability, transparency, disclosure so that people understand facts better. Institutions need to be strengthened and corruption rooted out decisively so that agency issues do not contaminate government-citizen social contracts - to restore trust. This is possible, because in the end the world can never run out of good people - generally.

All those nurses, doctors

The evidence is compelling and there for everyone to see. All those nurses, doctors and ambulance drivers risking their lives in order to save us during the Covid-19 pandemic confirms that there are many good people out there. More than ever before, different campaigns have raised enormous sums of money to help fund the health and economic responses of various countries, including safety net components to protect the poor and vulnerable. It shows that the world can save itself, it shows that this is not humanity's cul-de-sac moment at all. Because our world can never run out of good people.

#### **Ask for HELP**



When one sets up a business they hope that it will make a profit and that it will be able provide enough to take care of their financial needs. However, the number one mistake that I have seen with new entrepreneurs and even some seasoned ones is that they mix business finances with personal finances. The business may have cash flows but it doesn't equate to the owner having cash. Let's not forget that business is a separate legal entity and therefore distinct from its owners. They then struggle to restock their business, buy raw materials or maintain their equipment. Others even fail to pay employees on time because they have used up all the cash. This is prevalent in large companies as well as in small sole trader businesses. Below are suggestions on how to remedy this.

- Obtain separate bank accounts, one for business and another for personal or household use. Cash received for the business should be banked the next day and must not be mixed with household cash
- As a business owner, pay yourself together with the other employees at the end of the month or fortnightly. Pay yourself a decent wage in relation to your business not a wage that you think you deserve because you are a director. The owners wage should not cripple the operations of the company.
- Prioritize reinvesting in your business and not spending all profits on yourself or family. Restock your business, grow your asset base, maintain your equipment and have a plan for scaling operations.
- Understand the difference between cashflow and profit. The business may be cash rich but is it making a profit. A business owner needs proper record keeping in order to analyse expenses and income correctly and to determine whether the business is making a profit or not.
- This all hinges on self-discipline. An entrepreneur must be disciplined enough to delay gratification, to keep your hands away from the business purse whenever you have a need. Put limits and systems in place such that you are accountable to someone and they can assist you in keeping away from that money.
- Educate your family on what you are trying to achieve, how you are running the business so that they walk this journey with you in understanding. The result is, your spouse doesn't expect to take money from the business at any time because they understand that the family finances and business finances are separate. You need to manage your family's expectations by making them aware of the business philosophy that you have adopted. Teach your children what it means to run a successful business, the difference between cash and profit and the importance of reinvesting in that business. Children learn best from their parents.

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#### Avoiding disappointments when dealing with labour only building contracts

Clients who intend to execute building projects can either utilise supply and fix arrangements, whereby the builder/Contractor brings in materials, labour, equipment and everything necessary to bring the works to completion. With the client only left with the obligation to pay the contractor for labour and materials. Another option is a labour only arrangement, whereby the client buys materials and the contractor supplying labour and "equipment".

The labour contract has some grey areas that can potentially create different expectations, which can result in conflict situations between the client and the contractor and these need to be ironed out beforehand. From the above, three things ought to be clarified, first, the meaning of materials and secondly what labour only is and finally who supplies everything else which is not materials or labour only.

#### The meaning of materials

For this article, we defined materials as items that will "permanently" stick to the structure or that will stay with the structure owner when the construction project is complete. Examples include cement, brick, and sand. One may also add water to the list, though it will not be tangible when the building is complete; this is because water helps to convert most materials into a usable form. Depending on the agreement in place, the client can take responsibility for the storage and security of the materials.

#### Is it labour or labour only?

The inclusion of the word only after labour is often misleading. Apart from providing human resources, one would, and reasonably so, assume that the contractor should feed the employees. It implies that materials and labour have been clarified, including the respective responsibilities of the client and contractor. However, the question remains: What about everything else that is neither materials nor labour?

#### Who supplies everything else

Everything else can refer to equipment (scaffolding, formwork), machinery (compactors, generators) and tools (wheelbarrows). Whose responsibility is it, between the client and the contractor, to supply 'everything else'? Failure to clarify this area often leads to disappointment when one party feels let down by the other. It is vital that when the contractor submits a quotation, it should be clear on whether or not "everything else is included". Similarly, it is part of the client's due diligence to interrogate what a labour only quotation means.

The choice of who provides everything else is entirely dependent on two contracting parties. At times the client may at their discretion opt to do so. However, where the client is silent, the contractor ought to include in their pricing, everything else that is necessary to execute and complete a construction project and avoid "surprising" the client. Before accepting a labour only quotation, it is prudent that the client seeks clarification on the supply of everything else; otherwise a cheaper quote may end up being expensive in the long run due to some grey regions.
